Percent for Art work installed at Pennington Center in Baton Rouge

Artist Keith Sonnier's work "Grosse Tete" (pictured at different angles below) was installed at the Pennington Biomedical Research Center in Baton Rouge on Nov. 27, 2013.

The piece, which was commissioned with funds from the Percent for Art program, is located in one of Pennington's reception areas in or-

der to involve pedestrians as they move through the space. It is an electrically-charged sculpture, one of the artist's signatures, and includes a series of small mirrors fastened at varying angles to the metal armature to bring the viewer's image into the piece.

CODOFIL opens scholarships to young professionals

The Council for the Development of French in Louisiana (CODOFIL) has opened its scholarship program to young professionals for the first time this year. The scholarships, which are offered by the state agency's international partners in Belgium, France and Canada, have historically been offered to high school students in French, university French majors and minors and K - 12 French teachers. Thanks to a partnership with Université Sainte-Anne in Pointe-de-l'Église, Nova Scotia, two Louisiana professionals will receive scholarships covering about half of their expenses to participate in a five-week summer immersion program.

"As a young professional myself, upon starting at CODOFIL I was approached by so many of my peers expressing a desire to learn French but regretting never having taken the opportunity to do so while in school," Erin Stickney, CODOFIL's communications attaché, said. "We are extremely grateful for the support from the wonderful program at Sainte-Anne. Those wishing to learn French to further their careers or incorporate the language into their work environments should apply for this scholarship."

Richard H. Driehaus National Preservation Awards seeking nominations

The 2014 Richard H. Driehaus National Preservation Awards will be held on Thursday, Nov. 14, 2014, to celebrate the best of preservation over the past year, honoring individuals, organizations, agencies or projects whose contributions demonstrate outstanding excellence in historic preservation. The awards, which are presented by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, include:

- National Preservation Honor Award
- American Express Aspire Award: Recognizing Emerging Leaders in Preservation
- Trustees' Award for Organizational Excellence
- NTHP/ACHP Award for Federal Partnerships in Historic Preservation
- NTHP/HUD Secretary's Award for Excellence in Historic Preservation
- Peter H. Brink Award for Individual Achievement
- Louise du Pont Crowninshield Award

Saenger Theatre in New Orleans makes National Trust for Historic Preservation top 10 list

The Saenger Theatre in New Orleans made the National Trust's list of top 10 places that were saved from demolition in 2013. Built in 1927 as a movie house styled to resemble a 15th century Italian courtyard, it reopened as a performing arts space in 1970 and hosted acts like David Bowie, Bill Cosby and Johnny Carson. The Saenger Theatre was badly damaged during Hurricane Katrina, but thanks to massive public and private support, it reopened in October.

The rest of the list follows: Peavey Plaza in Minneapolis; Jensen-Byrd in Spokane, Wash.; Fort Monroe in Hampton, Va.; Stamford Post Office in Stamford, Conn.; Upper Missouri River Breaks in central Montana; Terminal Island at the Port of Los Angeles; Wrigley Field in Chicago; **Charleston Cruise Ship Terminal in** Charleston, S.C.; and five new national monuments—each representing a diverse chapter in American history—proclaimed by President Obama on March 25, 2013. National Arts and Humanities Youth Program Awards seeking nominations

The President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities, in partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Institute of Museum and Library Services, invites applications for the 2014 National Arts and Humanities Youth Program Awards.

Twelve winning programs will each receive \$10,000 and an invitation to accept the award from the President's Committee's honorary chairwoman, first lady Michelle Obama, at a ceremony at the White House. After-school and out-ofschool arts and humanities programs applying for the award must meet all of the eligibility criteria, which can be found here.

The deadline for application submissions is Monday, Feb. 10, 2014. The National Association of State Arts Agencies manages these awards on an annual basis through a cooperative agreement with the President's Committee. Click here to learn more.
