Summary Paragraph

The Bunche Library is eligible for listing for its historical significance at the local level in the areas of Education and Ethnic Heritage: Black. The Bunche Library is one of the only known examples of black libraries in the region. Sitting prominently in the primary corridor of a public housing neighborhood of Rayne, Louisiana, the freestanding Bunche Library has an air of monumentality in the predominantly black residential neighborhood. Built in 1953, the modest building was constructed as a one-room garage-style structure, with most of the materials used being wood. Although the structure needed some work due to neglect over the years, the interior has undergone no modifications during its restoration. There has been no major alteration to the front, except for the reconstruction of the original porch with in-kind materials, adding a handrail attached to the front steps and landing for safety purposes to comply with existing building code enforcement laws.

Narrative Description

Setting:

The building is currently located next to the Rayne Chamber of Commerce within the gateway to the City of Rayne. The original setting of the library was the between two residential buildings within a prominent African American neighborhood in Rayne. The lot featured a large tree in the front yard and a walkway directly abutting the sidewalk that led community members to the front porch. The building was moved eight blocks away on the same street to its current setting. The new setting reflects a similarly situated mixed-use African American neighborhood with public housing and city offices. A new walkway was created that directly abuts the sidewalk and leads patrons to the reconstructed front porch.

Exterior West Elevation (Façade): Photo 1

The Bunche Library is of wood construction with a gabled roof with exposed rafter tails, the exterior sheathed in board and batten siding, and situated on concrete piers. The front façade features a reconstructed porch utilizing in-kind wood materials to recreate the original porch that was lost. The porch includes a gabled roof overhang supported by two simple square columns similar to the original construction. The façade is punctuated by a single entry door to the left and a two-over-two window to the right. The door features a screen in the same pattern as the original depicted in historic photographs.

Exterior North and South Elevations: Photo 2-3

The library had two original two-over-two windows on the North and South elevations. These appeared to be covered with faux board and batten panels over the original siding which helped protect the original construction.

Exterior East Elevation (Rear) Elevation: Photo 4

The rear of the library retains the same board and batten siding and features one two-over-two window.

Interior: Photo 5-6

The interior of the library was largely empty. Drywall has been installed over the original wood paneling. The floor and ceiling are tongue and groove and mostly intact with only a few boards needing replacement.

Integrity:

The Library sustained deterioration over the years from neglect and weather. The Bunche Library originally was on private property and was unable to be relocated to its original location. The interior has undergone restoration to repair and replace damaged wood. The replaced wood was consistent with the same type of wood and material from the period of construction. On the exterior, some of the side and rear windows have been replaced, and a handrail has been added to the front landing, The building does, however, retain its identity in the community.

Despite these alterations the building retains integrity of setting, design, workmanship, feeling, and association. These alterations do not detract from the building's significance as the only public library available to the African American community during the period of significance. During its operation, the library had a prominent place in the community important center of the African American community. A rededication of the library was held on June 19, 2024, Juneteenth Day. Every first Saturday of the month, a different civic organization hosts an open house and children's event at the library. Today, it remains easily recognizable to library patrons who visited during the period of significance.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

The Bunche Library is significant at the local level under Criterion A, in the areas of Education and Ethnic Heritage: Black. The library building was the site of expanded learning opportunities for Rayne, Louisiana's Black population as it was the only public library in the city dedicated to their use. Additionally, the library came to serve as a small gathering place for many facets of the community. It was also frequently used as a meeting place for the Black Girl Scout troop and others to hold meetings. Due to closure and neglect, the building required structural reinforcement but still maintained the integrity of setting, design, feeling, and association. The building's period of significance is tied to its time as a library, from its opening in 1953 to the complete desegregation and consolidation of the City of Rayne libraries in 1980.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

In the early twentieth century, American libraries were in a period of transition. The end of the nineteenth century had seen libraries largely move from private to public. In Rayne, Louisiana, the city's public library was founded in the late 1940s and did little to increase access for Black citizens. This aspect of public education was exclusive to the white community. Black access to libraries was limited to bookmobiles established by community and faith-based organizations.

Concurrently, in 1890 philanthropist Andrew Carnegie began an unprecedented campaign to fund the construction of public libraries nationwide. Over the next three decades, Carnegie would donate \$45 million for the construction of 1,689 public library buildings. With cities often unwilling to fund the construction of facilities dedicated to African American use, many Black communities relied on grants from the Carnegie Foundation. However, most small rural communities did not get to benefit from these grants.

Name of Property

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In the City of Rayne, a plan was developed for a library that would be exclusively for the education of the Black population. This effort was due in large part to Our Mother of Mercy Catholic Church spearheaded by the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. The head librarian of the Acadia Parish Library and the mayor at the time, Mayor Gossen, championed the efforts and extended his full support of the project.

Branch Library Opened For Rayne Negroes On Monday, March 9, plans for a branch of the Acadia Parish Li-brary for the colored in Rayne materialized and preparations the establishment of the branch were discussed. At a meeting prior to the Monday meeting plans for the library were inargurated with a committee appointed to find a suitable place for the library. Selected to serve on this committee were Victoria Boudreaux, Earl Smith, and O. Welcome. Welcome reported several locations selected by the committee which were taken into considerations of the taken into considerations. tion. Of these the location chosen was the Sennett building located at 305 Reynolds St. Work is sche-duled to begin immediately on thebuilding. It will be moved up to the sidewalk and will be properly cleaned and renovated. This site was chosen for the library because of its central location. Fresent at the meeting were Mayor W. J. Gossen, who made known his interest in any project of benefit to the community, Mrs. Virginia Wilkins, parish librarian, wno is instrumental in the estab-lishment of the library, and the Sisters of Our Mother Of Mercy school. , Mrs. Wilkins gave the committee (Continued On Page 4)

The formal opening of the library will be held as soon as work on the building has been completed. In the meantime Mrs. Wilkins wift receive applications for the position, of librarian in the new

Name of Property

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On May 24, 1953, the Bunche Library in Rayne officially opened its doors to encourage and support the public education of African Americans in the community during the segregation era. The library was originally located at 305 Reynolds Street in the African American community. The selected location of Section Street was in a portion of the residential area of the African American community. It was spearheaded by the Our Mother of Mercy Catholic Church, built by prominent African American community leaders, and fully supported by the Acadia Parish Library. The library was named after Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, a renowned diplomat, civil rights activist, and leader. The rudimentary architecture of the building reflected the humble origins of many Black libraries of the time. From the beginning, the patrons took ownership of their library. The library opened without fanfare, only a photo taken in front of the building and published in the local newspaper.

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The Bunche Library building is the only remaining library building that served the Black population during the segregation of public libraries. In anticipation of the *Brown vs. The Board of Education* case that would mandate the desegregation of public schools and overturn the precedent of "separate but equal" facilities, the Sisters of The Blessed Sacrament and the Acadia Parish Library worked to faithfully to apply these principles to the libraries.

Name of Property

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The building was in operation as a public library for the African American community until it was officially closed due to consolidation with the city's main library in 1980. The building was moved to its new location in 2024 and officially reopened to the public on June 19, 2024. While there is little documentation about the educational and community efforts of the Bunche Library, it is a crucial cornerstone of the history of African American public education in the city of Rayne. During its operation, it served as the sole public library and gathering space for the African American community hosting many community events and meetings including for children's groups like the Black Girl Scouts. Access to public education during this time was limited to the African American community. The library offered vital services that helped bolster education in children through reading, writing, and tutoring. But it also became a vital service to adults as well offering many of the same services to improve reading, writing, and the basics of finances, career development, and even voting rights. The Bunche Library is the oldest known Ralph Bunche Library in the United States and is a prominent symbol of unity and progress. The library continues to foster education in the community hosting civic organization meetings and children's event at the library every first Saturday of the month. Today, it remains easily recognizable to library patrons who visited during the period of significance.

Barbara is pictured here holding a biography of Ralph Bunche, the man after whom the library was named. Bunche was the first Negro in American history to take over a desk in the State Department. His title today is Principal Director, Department of Trusteeship and Information for Non-Self Governing Territories of the United Nations Secretariat.






Figure 7 Newspaper Article, 1953


